Places to live in New Orleans

Tulane's campus is housed in the larger community of the City of New Orleans. There are many neighborhoods in and around New Orleans that offer a variety of benefits. Shotgun style houses and apartments are common in New Orleans, but it is possible to find traditional style apartments as well. Rent will generally be lower if choosing to live with more roommates, and some parts of the city are more expensive to live in than others. Flooding is an issue for many parts of New Orleans, so do what you can to determine the potential of flooding on your future block. The map below shows the location of some major neighborhoods in the city. Below we address some neighborhoods that grad students usually choose to live in. Also: if you have to rent sight-unseen, don't hesitate to reach out to see if someone will drive by the address or even do a walk through. We want you to be happy here!



Uptown/Carrollton

This neighborhood is the closest to Tulane's campus. It's great for folks who want to walk or bike to campus, but many undergrads also choose to live in off-campus housing in this neighborhood as well. The closer you live to campus, the more expensive it tends to be. A sizable portion of Uptown is taken up by Audubon Park.

Mid-City

Generally chill, this neighborhood is nice if you want to live somewhat close to campus (15 min drive) but still get away

from it at the end of the day. Very close to City Park, the Lafitte Greenway, and lots of cool restaurants.

CBD/Downtown

While Tulane does have a Downtown campus in addition to its main Uptown campus, the Downtown campus primarily houses Tulane's School of Medicine

and other similar public health programs. Tulane-affiliated housing Thirteen15 is located downtown and offers furnished studio, one-bed, and two-bed options (at a fairly hefty cost).

Gentilly

Large neighborhood made up of smaller neighborhoods in the north eastern part of New Orleans. Family friendly neighborhood with lots of newly built and or renovated homes for sale. Close to City Park, and restaurants in Mid City. Depending on where you live in Gentilly it can be a 15-20 minute drive to Tulane.

Transportation

Driving

Drivers in Nola aren't always paying attention and people run red lights quite often so make sure to be aware when biking, walking, driving.

The potholes are wild, do not feel pressured to go the posted speed limit down every road. Sometimes the road tells you what speed to go!

Speed cameras are no joke, especially in school zones where the speed limit is 20 mph during school day morning and afternoon hours. Tickets get mailed to your residence. (Almost everyone gets at least one their first year driving here!)

Tips for parking on/around campus:

- There is on campus parking available with a pass that you pay for per semester. It's expensive though!
- For quick loading/unloading of equipment, you can park behind Boggs (Engineering Rd.) and/or Israel (Law Rd.) in the loading dock/fire lane with hazard lights on
- Parking after 5:30 behind Boggs is free (2022 note: they're doing construction there now though so you can't park there)
- Free parking w/ no time limit on St. Charles in front of Tulane and Audubon park on both sides, but get there before 8 am for lots of parking spaces
- Many areas have 2 hr parking limits, pay attention to signs near campus!
- Must leave 3 feet between car and driveways or risk getting ticketed or towed
- Tulane Shuttle <u>Express Blue Line</u> takes you from University Square parking lot (200 Broadway St.) to the commons on the uptown campus. Parking is free at University Square

Biking

Roads and sidewalks in New Orleans are notoriously rough to ride on, but some (more major roads) are better than others. Always wear a helmet and always lock your bike with a U-Lock. There are parks to bike through like Audubon Park and City Park.

Public transportation

Streetcars and buses are run by the Regional Transit Authority RTA. The fare is \$1.25 which can be paid with cash (including any coins) or via the "Le Pass" app. The app can be used to buy tickets, plan/search routes, monitor bus/streetcar location, etc.

The buses and streetcar are most useful if you do not have a car and wish to move around the Uptown neighborhood on occasion.

There are also options for taking buses to and from the MSY airport:

- 1. The 202/201 express route goes from downtown to the airport (and vice versa) with no stops in between (\$1.25).
- 2. Transfer from a local RTA bus in your neighborhood to a Jefferson Parish bus (JET, usually bus E2) using a regional pass (\$6).

Go when I'm sick

(See also: <u>Tulane Healthcare</u>)

- Outside provider
 - As graduate students, we don't need a referral from Campus Health before seeing another provider. However, if you do pay the Tulane Health Center fee, you will need a referral before seeing another provider.
 - Some providers or insurance agents don't realize that this is the case for graduate students. If they try to refuse you care because you don't have a referral and you haven't paid the Tulane Health Center fee for this semester <u>push</u> back and demand care and coverage. (This was confirmed by Judith, who works at Campus Health).
- Tulane Health Center- on campus, at the corner of Willow St. and Audubon St. Costs \$375 to use the health center.
 - Make appointments through the <u>online patient portal</u>
 - Sometimes advance appointments aren't available, in which case call right when they open for a same-day appointment.
 - The Health Center can refer you out to other specialist clinics in New Orleans if necessary after an initial appointment
- Via the nurse line or HealthiestYou app you can call a physician if you are not feeling well and need some advice. Useful on the weekends or if you travel to another state. Times of response vary (you may wait hours for a call back), this app and the access to physicians (includes mental health counselors) is available to you with your insurance ID.

Go when I'm sad/anxious

- With T-SHIP, you also have access to the <u>Counseling Center</u> (located across from the Reilly Center between the Diboll Garage and the soccer field), which includes counselors and psychiatrists. There are also <u>group sessions</u>, two of which are specifically for graduate students, that happen regularly.
- The <u>Care Coordinator</u> is also happy to help you find referrals to providers in the community.
- <u>One Caveat</u> is that Tulane Counseling Center Providers will only see you if you are in the state of Louisiana.

1. Mississippi Sandhill Crane National Wildlife Refuge

(https://www.fws.gov/refuge/mississippi-sandhill-crane)

- Where: I-10 in Gautier, MS (1.5 hours from NOLA); free to visit the nature center and hike (Tuesday-Saturday 9am-3pm; trails open 7 days a week)
- What to do: Take a short (3/4 mile) hike through a Longleaf Pine/ Marsh system that has been recently burned. Look for Yellow Pitcher Plants, Tracy's Sundew, and other savannah forbs. And you might spot a Sandhill Crane! The interpretive center has informative displays, a short movie and a nice gift store. There are tours as well but I haven't been on one yet; there are also other hikes that are part of the refuge in Ocean Springs (Fontainebleau Trail – you can get a map at the nature center)

2. Ocean Springs, MS

- Where: I-10 (1 hour 20 minutes from NOLA)
- What to do: Ocean Springs is the home of Walter Anderson, one of the Gulf Coast's most beloved artist-naturalists. Read more about Walter Anderson here and visit the Walter Anderson Museum: https://www.walterandersonmuseum.org/. You can see the mural he painted in the Town Community Center for \$1, his "little room" that was unseen until after his death, the boat he rowed to Horn Island, rotating exhibits, etc. \$10 for adults, \$5 for students and educators. (Monday-Saturday 11am-5pm, Sunday 1-5pm)

- Then, check out **Shearwater Pottery**, Walter Anderson's family pottery shop: <u>http://www.shearwaterpottery.com/</u> Free. (open Monday-Saturday 9am-5:30pm, Sunday 1-5:30pm)
- Finally, take home some of your own Anderson artwork by visiting **Realizations**, an Anderson-dedicated clothing, print, and gift shop: <u>https://walterandersonart.com/</u> (open Monday-Friday 9am-5pm, Saturday 1-5pm, closed Sunday)
- **Blue Dog Bistro** has good gluten-free and vegan options for lunch <u>https://www.bluedogbistro.com/</u> (open Tuesday-Sunday 7am-3pm)

3. The Mississippi Gulf Coast from Pass Christian to Ocean Springs has lots of easily accessible beach along Highway 90. The water is shallow, warm and murky because it is part of the Mississippi Sound but it is a nice walk and spot to sit on the beach awhile. There are currently nesting Least Terns and Black Skimmers along some parts of the beach (protected areas). They have eggs and chicks right now!

4. Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of Art (<u>https://georgeohr.org/</u>)

- Where: Biloxi, MS (1+ hour from NOLA)
- What to do: Here you will find the incredible pottery of George Ohr, the mad hatter of Biloxi. He challenged the art world with his innovative, creative and sometimes totally wild pottery. The buildings were designed by architect Frank Ghery. There are rotating exhibits often by a diversity of under-represented artists, and there is also an exhibit about African-American culture in Biloxi.

5. Chandeleur Island Brewing Company in Gulfport is home to some of the best beer in the South. Dogs welcome. Open until 9pm.

6. Lynn Meadows Discovery Center <u>https://lmdc.org/r</u> in Gulfport is a great children's museum for those with younger kids. (Monday-Saturday 10am-5pm; Sunday 12-5pm)

7. Ship Island is fun in the spring and fall for a long beach walk on a barrier island, but summer is really just too hot! This is an hour-long ferry ride across the Mississippi Sound to the deeper waters of the Gulf of Mexico. Day trip.

8. Steve's Marina in Long Beach has great seafood poboys and shrimp sandwiches.

• If you're feeling super ambitious check out TNC **Splinter Hill Bog** (2.5+ hours from NOLA) north of Mobile to see an incredible White-Topped Pitcher Plant bog.

Study

- The Howard Tilton Memorial library (on campus-Freret) has very nice study areas for a range of needs. There are seats by the windows, and private rooms for individual or group study. <u>Check them out!</u>
- The LBC also has comfortable window seating.
- The Public Library near Jefferson Ave

Hurricane prep (just in case!)

Hurricane season starts June 1 and ends December 1 annually, and New Orleans does often see at least one storm during that time period. If you come from somewhere that hurricanes don't hit, your first storm can be a bit scary, but is usually nothing to worry about. Your best bet is to be prepared! Grocery stores and gas stations will be very busy right before a storm, so a little prep in advance will get you a long way. Here are some resources to help you get a good hurricane kit together. It is best to have these items gathered before a storm approaches.

<u>@thetindermeteorologist</u> on Instagram is a great resource for weather-related concerns in the city, including hurricanes. He posts forecasts and gives weather advice for the New Orleans area.

Before a hurricane or large rain event, cars can be parked on neutral ground (AKA the raised grassy median) to hopefully avoid flood damage. The City will send alerts via text when it is okay to park on neutral ground.

Renter's insurance is a good deal here, and if you evacuate you can claim evacuation mileage, food, and any damages to personal property that occur due to a storm.

Often locals say "cat 3 then flee", meaning they will evacuate only if the storm is predicted to be a Category 3 or stronger. This is generally sound advice, but evacuation is a personal choice depending on your comfort level and other needs (such as access to refrigeration for medication), except in the case of mandatory evacuation in which all individuals must evacuate. The City will not always issue a mandatory evacuation in the face of a strong storm, as evidenced by Hurricane Ida in 2021, so rely on your own judgment on when to evacuate.

On June 24, 2022 the US Supreme Court's *Dobbs decision*, overturned Roe v. Wade, revoking the constitutional right to abortion. As a result, Louisiana enacted a total abortion ban in the state. As of May 2023, it is still legal to travel to another state to receive an abortion. It is also possible to receive pills by mail (however it is not legal to take them). There are many abortion access resources available online.

In response to this ruling, Tulane put together a webpage with resources for pregnant and parenting people: <u>https://pregnancy.tulane.edu/</u>. If you find yourself pregnant, this site has information regarding case management, leave, parental support, mental health resources, and abortion access and legality.

There does not seem to be one unifying policy for paid parental leave. Students in EEB have been known to receive paid parental leave,though this is a conversation probably best had with your PI.

Required classes - PhD and MS students are required to take <u>Seminar</u> (RCSE 7100, 1 credit) thrice. It is usually offered every semester. Everyone is also required to take <u>Introduction to River Science and Engineering</u> (RCSE 6800, 3 credits, offered Spring) and <u>Introduction to Coastal Science and</u> <u>Engineering</u> (RCSE 6802, 3 credits, offered Fall) their first year. Students are also required to take a <u>Technical Writing Course</u> (RCSE 7020, 3 credits, offered Fall) in which students will be creating a draft of their proposal.

How many credits to take - 9 per semester is full time, but 48 are needed to advance to candidacy, so plan on 12 per semester. Use up to 9 credits for courses and fill in the rest with Independent study. Independent study credits (as many as you want) can be taken with your advisor to fill in gaps, so you don't need to take four structured classes per semester. There is a separate form to fill out in order to take independent study credits - ask your advisor or another grad student to send it to you.

As a pre-candidacy student, you should register for Independent Study credits, NOT Dissertation Research or Pre-Candidacy Research because they're more trouble to enroll in than they're worth (per Jack and Norah). Once you pass your Prospectus and advance to candidacy, you ONLY need to sign up for the Dissertation Research credits (3.0) to maintain full-time status.

CREW and GSSA

CREW - Coasts, Rivers, Estuaries Waders

CREW is the RCSE graduate student association. We meet once a month to hear from the GSSA representatives about events and funding deadlines, discuss grad student issues, and talk about any requests we might want to eventually take to faculty. All RCSE grad students (PhD, Masters, and Certificates) are encouraged to attend!

The <u>2021 Constitution</u> is the most recent.

GSSA - Graduate Studies Student Association

The Graduate Studies Student Association is the governing body for all Masters and PhD students in the School of Liberal Arts and the School of Science and Engineering at Tulane. We send 2 representatives to the meetings which happen monthly. Our representatives are able to ask GSSA for money for food at our CREW meetings and other social events!

GSSA and the Office of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (OGPS) offer travel awards for conferences. In order for RCSE grads to access these funds, we need to have good standing in GSSA. That means that we have to have our reps show up to the meetings.

Annual Reports

Every academic year (usually in the spring semester), we have to submit an annual report summarizing PhD milestones, classes taken, research done, skills gained, publications, TAships, etc. Start keeping track of these things early! The graduate studies coordinator will remind us of this and send out the annual review form to new students with a due date (April 15th). <u>Annual Review Form</u>

Committee Meetings

We are required to have a meeting with our dissertation committee at least once every academic year. You are required to have 4 committee members : 1) Your advisor, 2 & 3) RCSE professors (one of these can be a professor of the practice), and 4) an external committee member, usually a faculty member at another institution. Master's only required 3 RCSE professors. Committee meetings are typically held to update your committee on your research and to ask any questions that you might have regarding your projects. Remember, your committee is there to help and encourage you, so use their knowledge to your advantage! Your prospectus defense and private dissertation defense are both considered committee meetings.

Fees

Overall, pre-candidacy fees are around \$757 <u>per semester</u>. You pay them through the Gibson portal. The fees include:

- T-SHIP health insurance (\$1650, but 100% reimbursed from Tulane SSE, but that could change)
- Recreation center AKA Reily Gym (\$237)
- Activity fee (\$120)
- Academic service fee (\$400)
- Campus Health Fee (\$396, now fully reimbursed from Tulane SSE, but that could change)

Post-candidacy fees are around \$380 per semester. This does not include the recreation center fee, which you will be billed if you access this service during the semester.

- Activity fee (\$80/hour)
- Academic service fee (\$44.50/hour)

Reily Gym: This is the gym on campus and you are charged a fee as a part of your student fees (you cannot opt out until after achieving candidacy). For an extra cost you can also add your spouse/partner even if they are not students at Tulane. The gym is quite large, has 3 floors with plenty of cardio equipment, two rooms for lifting weights. Multiple basketball courts, a spin room and personal training rooms and an indoor track. They also have nice bathrooms equipped with lockers and showers. You can also rent outdoor equipment here.

Stipends

RCSE's base pay for PhD students is a \$35,000 annual stipend (as of 2024). This is the same stipend across all Tulane SSE PhD students paid via RAship. Payment schedule: This (Student Bi-Weekly) calendar tells you what days you will get paid. <u>https://hr.tulane.edu/payroll/payroll-calendars</u>

RA and TAs

RA: Research Assistantship. When funding comes outside of teaching. These are generally given by your PI, not the department, and mean different things in different labs. Talk with your PI to learn more about that.

RCSE does not have any TA's at this time. TA: Teaching Assistantship. It's one way we as grad students get funding. You won't get your TA assignment until a couple weeks before the semester starts. Generally expect a ~ 20 hr/week time commitment. Don't be afraid to ask others who have TA-ed a course before for resources, most folks are willing to share some materials and advice.

Teaching Resources

Journal Club – Active learning approaches will be introduced, and practiced!

Regional and national teaching workshops and MOOCs (Massive Open Online Classes) are available for graduate students – we try to spread the word when we hear about them!

Mentoring opportunities

EBIO2020 Theory and Methods in EBIO is a learner-centered course in which you may be invited (or volunteer!) to come and introduce your study system (or a lab-relevant system) as part of an in-class activity called ASK. The purpose of this activity is to get students generating research questions as part of the first steps in the scientific process. You are also welcome to come sit in on class if you would like to observe us in action.

Girls in STEM at Tulane (GiST) and Boys at Tulane in Stem (BaTS), a once-a-semester outreach event for middle school girls and boys, welcomes hour-long workshops and welcome tables. For more information contact Michelle Sanchez (sanchez@tulane.edu)

Women in Science and Engineering, the Green Club and other student groups are always looking for guest speakers who can share their stories and expertise. If you are short on mentoring experience these are good ways to get involved with the Tulane community."

Making a Scientific Poster

If you are planning to present your work at a conference or similar event, posters are a great way to get feedback on your ideas and your research! Poster sessions are generally an easier way to talk through your research with other experts in the field because it lends itself well to a back and forth conversation rather than a formal talk.

Generally speaking: posters are good for preliminary research and pilot studies to get feedback, whereas a talk is something you'd give once you've finished the study and want to share your results.

Poster Templates

You don't have to make a poster from scratch, there are plenty of templates available online to use! Powerpoint is an especially easy way to create your poster. Just make sure you choose a Powerpoint size that matches the specifications for your conference (for example: 48x36 is a common size). Printing a Poster

Printer on Fifth Floor Boggs

The Department of Biomedical Engineering on the fifth floor of Boggs has a poster printer. Ask John Sullivan in 533 Boggs for assistance. You will need to fill out a reimbursement form with your PI's approval and account number. Below are details and helpful tips from BME:

The BME poster printer is in the Grad Student study/break room, Boggs 546. You'll need a full-size PDF (open the file in Acrobat and check Properties) on a thumb drive. If you try printing a PPT, Word, or another MS-Office format file, you'll crash the printer, so I don't recommend having anything other than the PDF in that directory. Print jobs are charged at <u>\$3/square foot. FABRIC</u> JOBS ARE CHARGED AT A HIGHER RATE!!!!

- 1. Save your poster as a full-scale PDF. You can check the size by opening the file in Acrobat and clicking File -> Properties
- 2. Put the PDF on a thumb drive and do not have anything else in that folder (especially not a PPT file).

The paper is 42" wide, but I recommend limiting yourself to 41.5" to give yourself a margin (the printer can & does correct oversize prints in unpredictable ways). The other dimension of your poster is limited by the length of paper left on the roll; in general, anything longer than 72" is ridiculously large, but your mileage may vary.

If you are developing the poster in PowerPoint, you are limited to 56" in both directions, but you can still scale the image to fit a larger paper size when saving to PDF with Acrobat. There is just a little simple math required to maintain your proportions.



Getting More Space on Zotero- IP

If you are looking for an online literature organizing platform, Zotero is a good option. It's free, has great note taking and highlighting features, and has a desktop app. It also allows collaboration with others by including group libraries. Mac Instructions:

1. We get OneDrive free as Tulane students so make sure you have it downloaded/linked to your documents. On a Mac, it should look like this:



2. In your Finder window, find the folder for Zotero which contains all the files related to your desktop Zotero. Drag and drop this folder into the OneDrive location. Your Zotero folder should appear within OneDrive.

Navigating the System

As graduate students, we don't need a referral from Campus Health before seeing another provider. If we do pay the Health Center fee, however, then we are expected to see them for a referral before using outside providers.

Some providers or insurance agents don't realize graduate students aren't undergrads. If they try to refuse you care because you don't have a referral – and you haven't paid the Tulane Health Center fee for this semester – <u>push</u> back and demand care and coverage.

- Judith noted that if your registration is not full-time, the system doesn't always display your status as a grad student properly. That is, it may look to an insurance agent that you need a referral, but you still don't.

• You should also NEVER need a referral for women's health.

If you enroll in the Tulane Student Health Insurance Plan (TSHIP), you will get coverage for the whole year, from August 19th - August 18th.

If you pay the campus health center fee, that covers your use of the health center from July 1st - December 31st.

Restrictions: The department has to be in good standing with GSSA, which just means our reps are attending the meetings. Use for event registration and transportation. Must book airfare/train through Concur if you're flying. Cannot be used on hotels or food. Cannot be used for membership in a professional society (unless you can show that you only joined the society to get their discount on a conference).

Reimbursements: Instructions for filing reimbursements are detailed on the GSSA page on travel funding (see link above). Note that the instructions refer to paper receipts, but everything is submitted digitally. For proof of presentation and attendance, a photo of your name badge works great. For proof of flights, use your boarding passes. Reimbursements should be submitted to the GSSA reps.

Pro tips: Do not pay with your own money expecting reimbursement from GSSA. These reimbursements can take months, and it's best to use your advisor's purchase card, if they have one, or confer with them on how to cover the expenses upfront.

Dean's Travel Fund

The award can only be used to cover hotel, conference registration, airfare, Uber/Lyft, Taxi, and car rental.

Reimbursements: Once your travel is complete, please email segrad@tulane.edu the following information for reimbursement approval:

- Copy of the receipt to be reimbursed (Your Name needs to be on that Receipt)
- It must show the travel expense as paid in full.
- (Hotel, Flight, Uber, Lyft, Conference Registration)
- Proof of attendance
- Proof of Presentation

As required, please include:

- If a Faculty/Department is paying for your travel through Concur, please include the department accountant on your email request.
- If GSSA is covering part of your expenses, please include this information in your email.
- Make sure to submit your travel reimbursement documents in a timely manner (no more than 30 days after the conference).

Pro Tips: As with the GSSA award, don't book using your own money. Talk with your advisor about how best to fund the trip.

Travel FAQ

Does RCSE have a travel fund?

No. But you should not be paying for your own travel. Coordinate travel with your PI (or Michelle) so they can pay for it. Still apply for the grants above.

How should I book my travel?

All conference travel and field work travel needs to be booked on Concur or with World Travel. There are no reimbursements outside of the Concur travel system.

What documentation do I need to save?

You need to save all of the boarding passes for your travel. Also proof of attendance/presentation, such as a photo of your name badge and your name in a program.

I missed the deadline, but I just found out about a conference coming up. Can I still apply for GSSA-OGPS funding?

No applications are accepted once the GSSA application form has been closed. Funding decisions are based on the original number of applicants, and they are only made once per cycle.

I wasn't able to attend my conference this cycle. Can I use the GSSA Travel funds later?

Email <u>treasurer.gssa@tulane.edu</u> in advance you can't attend your conference. Up to the date of the conference, you can email the treasurer to rescind your travel application and retain eligibility for future cycles. You will still need to reapply for that cycle, and it's not guaranteed that you'll have the same amount of funds.

I won't know if my poster is accepted until after the travel deadline. Should I still apply for GSSA Travel funds?

Yes. You should still apply, and if you decide not to attend the conference, reach out to <u>treasurer.gssa@tulane.edu</u> ahead of time and let them know you won't attend this cycle but would like to retain eligibility for funding for future cycles.

• Add a printer PC: start menu, search for "add a printer or scanner", select "add a printer" at the top. Your PC will try to pull up all the printers on the network and that's a lot, so after it searches for a minute, select "the printer I want is not listed" and a dialog box opens.

Click the radial button called "add a printer using an IP address or hostname" and click next. The next screen has a dropdown menu next to "device type", **select "TCP/IP Device" and in the box next to "hostname or IP address" type in prt400boggs.tulane.edu** and select next. It will automatically contact the printer and add it. If it asks you to select the driver click on Xerox on the left-hand box and then "Xerox workcentre 5955" and it should either identify the driver you already have (from when you connected to the printer using the old IP address) or it will download the correct driver from the Xerox 5955. You are now connected.

• Add a printer Mac: Look I have a Mac at home, but I don't add printers very often. I will go from memory so forgive if this isn't as thorough as the PC instructions. Basically find printers in the system settings and on the left hand side there is a list of printers at the bottom of that box there is a very subtle "+" button, click it to add a printer. It should then give you the same option as above, you connect to the printer via TCP/IP and type in prt101boggs.tulane.edu where it says "IP address or hostname" and it should also automatically download the correct driver based on what the Xerox tells it OR it will use the previously installed driver from when you used to be able to connect via the old IP address.

RCSE Department Vehicles

You need to be certified to drive a Tulane vehicle. This can take a few days to process, so do it sooner rather than later! Guidelines: <u>Motor Pool Guidelines</u> <u>& Reservations | The Lavin-Bernick Center (tulane.edu)</u>

RCSE has one truck and one boat.

- If you use a vehicle and the gas tank is not full, tell Jack! If there is time, he will usually fill it for you, or tell you to fill it to the level it was left. Usually grad students are using their own grant money for this and it's not fair to expect us to fill more gas than we use.
 - Short trips in town (like to the greenhouse and back) generally don't need a gas refill, but check with Jack to make sure.
- If something is wrong with a vehicle, tell Jack right away so that it doesn't get worse and he can give you a safer vehicle to drive!
- If you don't have a personal vehicle but need to make a trip to a local hardware store, etc. for lab or experiment materials, a departmental vehicle can be used for that purpose as well.
- For international students you must have an American Driver's License for a minimum of two years to be able to reserve a vehicle from the EEB office.

The mileage fee is to cover the cost of maintaining the trucks. **You must still fill up the truck after your trip**. As always, a PI can use their T&E Card for the gas or a grad student can pay out of pocket and get reimbursed.

EBIO Department Vehicles

- Jack also handles department vehicle reservations.
- EBIO has a couple of pickup trucks, a few 11-passenger vans, and a ratty minivan.

• If you are driving a vehicle as a course TA, you can fill up the gas tank on campus using the gas card in the glove compartment. Email Jack for instructions.

New (as of 2022) Research Vehicle Booking Instructions:

- 1. Look on a google calendar to see if the vehicle is available.
- 2. Use a google form to book the vehicle and input trip information
 - Several acknowledgements of Dept vehicle rules, including a new policy of charging a mileage fee (research purposes only no fee for teaching purposes. You will need to get the account number from your PI before taking the vehicle.)
 - 2. Selecting what vehicle
 - 3. Trip information and dates
 - 4. The creation of a unique trip ID so we can track the trips (ex. PI name-date of trip). You will need to remember this ID.
 - 5. Grant or other account that we can use to charge your PI for the mileage
- 3. Use another google form to track your mileage (the digital version of the mileage book in each vehicle) (we're exploring putting QR codes in each vehicle to make this easier)
 - 1. Input your unique trip ID
 - 2. Input your beginning mileage
 - 3. Input your ending mileage

The booking form and the mileage form will port to a spreadsheet that we will use to charge your PI's account; the vehicle booking form will also port to the google calendar making your reservation official.

Considerations for International Students

Office of International Students and Scholars

Once you have been accepted to Tulane (whether you're currently at another US based institution or not) you will be contacted by a Program Officer from the *Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS)*. Through this office all of your paperwork to maintain student status (SEVIS, F-1 form) will be managed.

The OISS is a helpful office and you can email them to ask questions about: where to go to get a driver's license, social security card and questions about your status in general. Here is a website with people you can contact for specific questions:

You can also email their general OISS address if you can't find something online and need to be directed to a resource, they are usually quick to respond: <u>oiss@tulane.edu</u>

It is so important to be aware of these emails as soon as you're accepted because you want to get as quick a start on the procedures of obtaining a Social Security Card (again if you are not yet in the US). As soon as you have this card you will be able to be paid based on the payroll schedule.

Insurance/Taxes/Payroll/etc

If you have not been living in the US before, your country may have a different way to manage taxes or insurance. It can be overwhelming to understand the different nuances. One recommendation is to read **ALL** emails sent by OISS or a program officer from this office. Emails from these offices and even Newsletters from the office have important information on tax workshops, signatures you need if you are going traveling outside the US for the holidays, etc.

When in doubt about a process, email OISS first, they can direct you to an appropriate contact.

Bank account

For New Orleans, go with Chase bank. It is easier if you use this bank to access atms (even on campus). You may need cash and coins in particular to run washing/drying machines if you live in an apartment complex.

Getting hired

To keep student status you need to be enrolled every semester, before candidacy for PhD students that is 9 credits. OISS will contact you if they notice that you are not in compliance with the number of credits. After PhD candidacy you may enroll on one course called Thesis/Dissertation Research which is 3 credits and it will be enough for keeping the student status.

Moving Around - Transportation

If you do not have a car and do not plan on getting one, consider the following. Disclaimer: This varies from person to person.

- Where you live: Pay attention to neighborhoods close to grocery stores or close to the bus lines (see transportation above for bus info).
- To get to the Office of Motor Vehicles or any other store that is farther from Uptown neighborhood, the apps Uber/Lyft or asking a colleague/friend may be your best bet because it may require 2-3 buses to get to these places.
- Staying late on campus is something that can happen if you wish to work at the library or your office until late. Consider using the <u>Tulane</u> <u>TransLōc On Demand</u>, a university app with a shuttle that runs from campus to your home as long as it is within 1 mile radius from campus. Waiting times vary, usually under 20 minutes but on busy exam weeks it may be a longer wait so keep in mind that it may be better to ask for a TransLoc between 6pm - 8pm and if you have to cancel and live close it may be ok to walk home. But if you wait until 10pm and the TapRide is non-responsive it may be best to take an Uber home. TapRide costs nothing, just show your student ID.
- School shuttles: Tulane has shuttles that can take you from the uptown to the downtown campus on weekdays or from campus to a Walmart-Whole Foods on weekends. The disadvantage is that you always have to be picked up or dropped off on campus, the advantage is it costs nothing you just use your Student ID.

The Final Semester

Other Checklist Items

Candidacy Forms

You should have gotten forms signed by your committee after defending your prospectus. Just in case, you may want to track them down because the graduate admissions office may have misplaced them. You could also include them in your email to <u>segrad@tulane.edu</u> when submitting your dissertation requirements. These forms should also be in your EEB student file, so reach out to Norah if you don't have the full signed copies saved.

Admission to Candidacy Form Prospectus Approval Form

Room Reservations

The student will handle the room reservation for the public defense, but you may have to reserve a conference room for your private defense. Confirm the public defense room with your PI a few days before, because sometimes rooms get canceled and changed at the last minute.

Public Defense Flyer

The public defense is also created by your PI. About a week and a half (or later) before your public defense, Your PI will email you asking for photos to use for your flyer, and post it on bulletin boards.

Alumni Association

<u>Alumni Card</u>

After you graduate, you can apply for an Alumni Card, which gives you continued access to in-person campus resources like the libraries and the Reily center.

Alumni Benefits

As an alumni, you will receive benefits that can be found <u>here</u>.

Post-Grad Health Insurance

FYI, If you enroll in T-SHIP in the fall semester, your insurance won't be terminated until mid- August of the following year. You still have to pay a fee for the spring semester, but EEB will still cover half, which is much cheaper than other health insurance policies!

If you are looking for health insurance after your T-SHIP has ended, sometimes the individual insurance provider websites will have cheaper plans than Marketplace Health. You can also find short-term insurance plans outside of the enrollment period.

Appendix

Notes for editors

When you add/edit something, update the cover page with the date!

How to add a new entry to a section:

- Please add whatever you think will be helpful to others!
- Place your cursor at the end of the section above where you want the new section to go
- To add the section title to the doc's outline on the left, choose the "Heading 2" format instead of "Normal text"
 - $\circ~$ This not only looks good, but also updates the index with a link to the section.
- After making your changes, refresh the <u>Table of Contents</u>. You do this by clicking in the box, and clicking the circular arrow that appears next to the top left corner.

How to add a new section:

- Place your cursor at the end of the section above where you want the new section to go
- Go to Insert → Break → Page break. A new blank page should appear.
 Ctrl + Enter should also work
- To add the section title to the doc's outline on the left, choose the "Heading 1" format instead of "Normal text"
- After making your changes, refresh the <u>Table of Contents</u>. You do this by clicking in the box, and clicking the circular arrow that appears next to the top left corner.
